On July 4, 2025, around a dozen people gathered outside the ICE Prairieland Detention Center in Alvarado, Texas, for a noise demonstration in solidarity with the immigrants and detainees inside. People showed up ready to make noise and stand up against attacks on our communities. An allegedly occurred altercation where an officer sustained an injury. Ten people were arrested, and state and federal police then charged them with allegations of terrorism and attempted murder.



OUR FRIEND DES IS IMPRISONED

On July 6, after receiving a phone call from his wife, who had been arrested after the Prarielend demonstration, Des was followed by FBI agents in Denton, Texas. They pulled him over and quickly arrested him at gunpoint. He was later charged with allegedly transporting "a box that contained numerous Antifa materials" based on political pamphlets purported found in his truck.

Des has been in federal prison, pretrial, since July, and also is a green card holder on an "ICE hold", threatened with deportation.



Those who know Des know him as one of the kindest, most generous, and reliable people we know.

SOLIDARITY MEANS

On November 13, in a superseding indictment, Des was named with eight others for purportedly being part of a (fictitious) "North Texas Antifa Cell." He again was accused of supposedly transporting "Antifa materials," but now in a purported "conspiracy to conceal documents"

ZINES ARE NOT A CRIME

These alleged materials are widely available zines, found in many libraries and bookstores online and off.

Collecting, sharing, and transporting political material is not a crime; it's what librarians, artists, educators, publishers, and pamphleteers DO.

Political literature, even **controversial or dissident**, must not be allowed to justify **targets for repression**.
